Director's Message . . .



2004-2005 The academic year has been a remarkable one for Chicano/ Latino Studies. For the first time in UCI's history, there are nine core faculty members in Chicano/Latino Studies. This represents phenomenal growth. But growth alone is not sufficient. Growth numbers has in coincided with quality. The level of

scholarship among CLSP faculty places the Program among the best programs in the nation. Students have responded as well, with CLSP classes experiencing significant growth in enrollments this year, and a steady increase in the number of majors. CLSP is well poised for its development into a department.

Taking into consideration recent events in the nation at large, the development of a strong, research oriented Chicano/Latino Studies Program at UC Irvine comes nonetoo-soon. Latinos, both U.S.-citizens and immigrants, are under assault on many fronts. At the U.S.-Mexico border in Arizona, members of the Minuteman Project perform an act of surveillance, searching for Mexicans crossing the border clandestinely. The Minuteman are armed, untrained, and operate outside jurisdiction of the law, as private "vigilantes" (President Bush's term). Unfortunately, armed posses hunting Mexicans have a dark legacy in the history of the Southwest, creating unnecessary suffering and divisions among people.

There is also a movement to deny citizenship to children born in the United States if there parents are undocumented immigrants. A bill to accomplish this was introduced in the U.S. Congress this Spring, which, if nothing else, fans the flames of the already vitriolic debate over immigration. Should such a policy actually become law, it

FACULTY NEWS

Leo Chavez, Professor of Anthropology and Director of Chicano/Latino Studies, recently wrote an op-ed pieced featured in the Miami-Herald. Chavez' article highlighted the continued debate regarding citizenship in the US. Chavez focused on the importance of recognizing the diversity of the US particularly by continuing to embrace new



immigrants. His article is thought provoking and accessible at: <u>www.miamiherald.com</u>. The article entitled "U.S. Citizenship: Americans by Birth" was featured on March 14, 2005. On January 27, 2005, **Chavez** presented his work entitled "Latinos in a Global Society: A Mosaic of Diversity, Influence and Social Access" at the University Club as part of the Social Science Dinner Club hosted by the School of Social Sciences Dean Barbara Dosher (pictured above with Professor Leo Chavez).

Louis DeSipio, Associate Professor in Chicano/ Latino Studies and Political Science, in Spring presented at the University of Michigan and Yale University. At Michigan he presented the results of a research project on coalition formation in congressional elections in Latino majority districts. DeSipio's particular focus is on the first reelection of Congresswoman Loretta Sanchez in California's 46th District. And at Yale, he presented a paper on the policy foundations of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and the 1975 Amendments.

Lisa Garcia Bedolla, Assistant Professor

Chicano/Latino Studies and Political Science, was awarded a 2004-05 postdoctoral fellowship from the UCLA Institute of American Cultures. Garcia Bedolla has articles forthcoming in the *Harvard Journal of Hispanic Policy* and *California Policy Issues Annual*, including a number of chapters in edited volumes. With Co-PIs, Melissa Michelson and




Donald Green, Garcia-Bedolla received a \$50,000 grant from the James Irvine Foundation to study the effects of community-based political mobilization efforts in Southern California and the Central Valley. **Deborah Vargas,** Assistant Professor in Chicano/ Latino Studies, in February presented her research at the "Latino Music Symposium" at the University of Washington, Seattle, where she also participated in planning meetings for a future museum exhibit on Latino music



co-sponsored by the Experience Music Project and the University of Washington, Seattle. At Macalester College, a Latino Studies conference initiated as part of a future anthology Vargas presented her research on "Beyond El Barrio: Everyday Life in Latino America." In April, at the annual meeting of the Cultural Studies Association in Tucson, Arizona, she participated in a roundtable on "Critical Dialogues in Chicana Feminist Cultural Studies."

PUBLICATIONS

Louis DeSipio, Associate Professor Chicano/LatinoStudies and Political Science, has completed a new co-edited book with Rodolfo O. Garza entitled *Muted Voices: Latinos and the 2000 Elections*. The themes that the book explores help identify trends in Latino voter participation. The book focuses on key state electoral results and was recently used in a unique course taught this past Winter quarter, entitled "Latinos in the



2004 Election," which coincided with the 2004 Presidential and statewide elections.

Cynthia Feliciano, Assistant Professor Chicano/Latino Studies and Sociology, published an article in the February 2005 issue of Demography entitled "Educational Selectivity in U.S. Immigration: How do Immigrants Compare to Those Left Behind?"

Lisa Garcia-Bedolla, Assistant Professor Chicano/ Latino Studies and Political Science, has a new book titled, *Fluid Borders: Latino Power, Identity and Politics in Los Angeles*, that will be published by UC Press this fall.

Gilbert Gonzalez, Professor Chicano/Latino Studies and Social Sciences, has two forthcoming books: *Guest Workers or Colonized Labor? Mexican Labor Migration to the United States* and a co-edited book (with Raul Fernandez, David Smith, Vivian Price and Linda Trinh Vo) entitled Labor Versus Empire: Race, Gender and Migration. *(Continued next page)*
