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History 151B Chicana/Chicano History: Twentieth Century

Course Description:

This course will examine the cultural, economic, social, and historical forces shaping the twentieth century Chicana/Chicano experience in the United States. Using an interdisciplinary approach this course will focus on what constitutes Chicana/Chicano History. This debate has not only influenced the writing of this experience, but its development in the twenty-first century. We will consider whether this experience should be regionally, nationally, and historically focused, or characterized as a pan-Latino experience incorporating studies of both Chicanos and Latinos within and beyond the national boundaries of the United States.
