Visions of Belonging:
Chicana History through Film

This course will examine Chicana women's cultural, economic, intellectual, and social development and diversity in the United States historically. Using an interdisciplinary feminist approach and feature length films and documentary, we will advance our understanding of how class, ethnicity, gender, immigration, law, labor, memory, race, representation, and sexuality influenced the Chicana experience in the United States. Chicana women's consciousness, identity formation, ingenuity, labor, marginalization, and resilience underscores visions and struggles for belonging, empowerment, and survival critical to the chronicling and making of History.
